Established on October 16th, 1989, ESN is focused on supporting and developing student mobility. ESN offers services to around **350,000 students** each year, organised by around **15,000 active members**.

ESN offers help to full-degree and exchange students in the academic, social and practical integration process, mainly through activities.

'Love for Europe as an area of peace and cultural exchange'





INTERNATIONAL DINNER

The International Dinner Committee (IDC) is in charge of organizing the popular "gezellige" International Dinners every three to four weeks!

The goal of these dinners is for international students to showcase and celebrate the food, culture, and vibe of their home country. Participants can enjoy traditional meals and experience a different culture's culinary traditions.

Every time, three students from the "host" country are invited to cook a delicious threecourse meal. In between the meals, the IDC organises activities to introduce you to the culture of the country!





ACTIVE MEMBERS

The Active Members Committee of ESN Groningen is the main connection point for all committee members in ESN. They are responsible for the bonding between all other committees and organising some creative team-building experiences.

Among these are two active member weekends, each in the beginning of a semester, as well as a Christmas dinner, picnics, sports activities, and many more! You could say that the Active Members Committee is the beating heart of the organisation.



LIVE MUSIC NIGHT

The Live Music Night Committee is in charge of organising one of ESN Groningen's biggest events throughout the year - the Live Music Night.

The committee gets about 60 student musicians and together with them, puts an unforgettable set list together. This event happens twice a year - once in May and once in December.

BUDDY & INTEGRATION

Quarters of Groningen

Binnenstad

Welcome to the vibrant heart of Groningen, the Binnenstad (City Centre). Here, you'll find the bustling Grote Markt, a central square encircled by historic buildings, cosy cafés, and charming restaurants.


Don't miss the Forum, often referred to as "the living room of Groningen," where you can catch a movie, explore a vast library, visit a museum, and enjoy breathtaking city views from the rooftop terrace. Nearby, the Vismarkt hosts a bustling market three times a week - Tuesday, Friday and Saturday, offering high-quality food at affordable prices.

Korrewegwijk

Korrewegwijk, named after the Korreweg that links the northern quarters to the city centre, is a diverse neighbourhood bursting with flavours from around the world.

The highlight here is the Stadstrand - an urban beach in the heart of the city, featuring the cleanest water in Groningen. Discover a vibrant local food scene with international restaurants and supermarkets offering an array of culinary experiences.





Stationsgebied

Stationsgebied is your transportation hub, situated around the central train station. It's where all connecting buses and trains depart, making it a gateway to explore Groningen and beyond.

Explore the rebuilt old station building, a post-WW2 architectural gem worth visiting. Another gem is the Groninger Museum, known for its striking architecture and its diverse range of art and exhibitions, offering free entrance to students.

Oosterparkwijk

Oosterparkwijk, beloved by students for its proximity to the city, features delightful small parks. Situated adjacent to UMCG, the university hospital serving the entire northern Netherlands, the area also houses university buildings for medical studies.

On the other end of the quarter, you'll discover "het blauwe dorp," a picturesque village constructed to resemble the 1920s countryside, offering a unique and peaceful escape.

Westerhaven

Helpman



Cat Café: Where Feline Friends Rule




STEP 6: CYCLE HOME SAFELY

Schiermonnikoog



Gasselterveld



GET ON YOUR BIKE

Nowhere in the world is cycling as established as it is in the Netherlands. In fact, there are more bicycles than people here! On top of that, Groningen is counted as the best bike city in the world. Naturally, buying or renting a bike is a top priority for any student moving here. So here are a few tips for people new to the Netherlands, and looking to indulge in the biking culture.

TRAFFIC RULES AND SIGNS

When biking in Groningen, always keep the city's rules and regulations in mind. Here are some important signs and road markings that you will find in Groningen.



Haaientanden, also called "shark teeth", is a type of marking used to inform drivers where they need to yield and give priority to the conflicting vehicle traffic at an intersection or roundabout controlled by the yield sign.



Tegelijk groen: traffic from all directions can cross the intersection at the same time. This is unique to Groningen! The best way to navigate this is to make eye contact with the people in the direction you are going, and aim for an open spot in the flow of traffic. You have to pay attention to your surroundings, and exude confidence (fake it 'till you make it). Even here though, you still have to keep in mind that traffic from the right has more priority, and there are still shark teeth.



Rechtsaf voor fietsers vrij: Cyclists can turn right at the light. Most intersections in the Netherlands do not permit cyclists (or motorists) to turn right on red. But if you see this sign, it means you can. It's usually at intersections where there's enough space to turn right without cars or buses having a blind spot where they may not see you.

LEARN THE RULES



Uitgezonderd: Uitgezonderd translates to except. You'll see this word underneath one way and no entry traffic signs, and usually black symbols underneath for different modes of transportation. This means that most traffic cannot enter that road, except for the symbols: bikes are almost always uitgezonderd in these situations.

SAFETY TIPS

Give the phrase "Locks are second to none" the utmost importance. You should invest in the best lock you can find, because take us at our word that if you don't, your bike is as good as gone. The next thing to keep in mind is to never park your bike in public spaces for indefinite periods of time.

You should also consider purchasing bike insurance if your bike is particularly expensive.

Watch out! When you're crossing the road on your bicycle, check the markings. If the lane has white rectangles on both sides, stop! Cars have priority.

WHERE TO BUY/RENT BIKES

There are several facebook groups where private owners sell their bikes. You can find a variety of bikes here, both new and old. However, always do your research before purchasing a second hand bike, and always meet the seller in person before purchasing a bike.

If you would like to buy a new bike, there are plenty of bike sellers located in and around the centre of Groningen that can provide a variety of options.

It is also possible to rent a bike from some of these stores, although if you're planning on staying in one place for a longer period, it's wiser to purchase a bike.

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Housing rights

Understanding Dutch Housing Rights: A Guide for International Students in Groningen

One of the most vital aspects of your new life is securing appropriate housing. The Netherlands, like many countries, has specific housing laws and regulations, and it's essential to be wellinformed about your rights as a tenant.

The Dutch legal system places a strong emphasis on tenant rights, ensuring that you are treated fairly and have the necessary legal protection.

Housing Contracts: When you find a place to rent in Groningen, you'll typically sign a rental contract. These contracts can vary in length, with some being fixed-term and others indefinite. It's essential to carefully read and understand the terms and conditions before signing.

Pay close attention to rent amounts, contract duration, and any additional costs, such as service fees or utilities. Also, watch out for "Excl. G/W/E" (excluding gas, water, electricity) or "Incl. G/W/E" (including gas, water, electricity) – these details could impact your expenses.

Always double-check your rental period, whether it's fixed-term or indefinite, and the notice period required for ending the tenancy agreement.

Terminating your rental agreement: Your landlord cannot terminate your contract without good reason, and even then, justifying those reasons can be challenging for them. Seek advice, as you may have more rights than you realize. In any case, they must give you a minimum of three months' notice, plus one month for every year you've lived there.

Subletting: Dutch housing law allows students to sublet their room for a certain period. The subletter must sign a contract specifying when they must vacate the apartment or room. Before subletting, check if it's allowed in your rental

agreement and seek permission from your landlord. Subletters have nearly the same rights as regular tenants.

Rent Allowance (Huurtoeslag): Depending on your living situation, income and age, you may be eligible for rent allowance from the government. This can help reduce the financial burden of renting a place in Groningen. You can read more about it here: www.belastingdienst.nl

Maintenance and Repairs: Your landlord is responsible for maintaining the property and addressing necessary repairs. Promptly communicate any issues and keep written evidence of your interactions, along with photos of items needing repair. They can't enter unannounced, and they must give prior notice before entering.

Dispute Resolution: In case you encounter issues with your landlord or other housingrelated disputes, there are legal avenues to seek resolution. This includes mediation and the Dutch court system. In general, a tenants rights are highly protected by Dutch law.

Seeking Legal Assistance: If you encounter a housing-related dispute that you can't resolve with your landlord, seeking legal guidance is vital. The "Juridisch Loket" in the Netherlands offers free legal advice and can help you navigate housing issues.

The Groninger Studentenbond (Groningen Student Union) is a valuable resource for international students in Groningen. They offer legal assistance and support, ensuring your housing rights are protected.

Finding housing: When searching for housing, for example on Facebook, you should exercise due diligence, and be careful with whom you share your personal information.

Health Care

Navigating healthcare in the Netherlands is essential for international students. Two crucial aspects to consider are finding a General Practitioner (GP) and obtaining health insurance.

GENERAL PRACTITIONER (GP)

In the Netherlands, your GP is your first point of contact for medical advice. To access specialist care or hospital services, you need a referral from your GP. However, GPs have patient limits, so finding one that can accept you may be necessary. One exception is HuisartsGroningen.nl, which offers various healthcare providers in one location, making it convenient for international students.

When selecting a GP, consider proximity to your residence, especially for emergencies. Registering with a GP is essential before any health issues arise. GPs can also assist in understanding health insurance, as it can be complex. Your GP's visits are covered by Dutch health insurance, making it important to register early.

For urgent medical needs outside of regular office hours, contact the Doctors Service ("doktersdienst") at 0900-9229.

In an acute medical emergency, call the national emergency number 112.

HEALTH INSURANCE

Health insurance is mandatory for international students in the Netherlands. It covers various medical expenses, including GP consultations, specialised care, and even repatriation if necessary. To ensure your medical costs are covered, it's crucial to have health insurance in place before you experience any health issues.

The University of Groningen collaborates with AON Insurance to provide insurance options for students. The "Complete+" insurance policy, available during a specific enrolment period, covers care for preexisting medical conditions as well as future ones.

ESN partners with Swisscare to provide a 10% discount on their "International Student Health Insurance Plan Europe" During your studies abroad, this product covers medical emergencies in case of illness and accidents. A 24/7 assistance is included, as well as search & rescue, repatriation to the home country, and third party liability.

This insurance is suitable for international students, interns, au pair's, academics, researchers, and their family members (spouse, children) if the following applies: All foreign students, interns, au pair's, academics, researchers in the EU / EEA. All EU / EEA resident students, interns, au pair's, academics, researchers studying or training abroad excluding US Territories and Canada.

Mentaehe

Mental health is a critical aspect of student wellbeing in the Netherlands. The academic and social pressures of studying in a foreign country can sometimes take a toll on a student's mental health. It's important for international students to be aware of the available resources for support.

CONFIDENTIAL ADVISORS

If you feel the need to speak to someone, about personal or confidential matters, ESN has four confidential advisors that have been professionally trained to respond to personal matters.

STUDENT PSYCHOLOGIST

The University of Groningen provides psychologists at the Student Service Centre (SSC). They can help students with problems relating to your studies (such as stress) and psychological problems (such as anxiety or depression).

You can find more information about SSC on the university's website.

Hanze University of Applied Sciences provides student psychologists, who do not focus on treating severe (pre-existing) psychological disorders. They use a solution-oriented approach, aimed at keeping psychological problems from getting worse and maintaining your role as a student, to prevent dropout. If necessary, the student psychologist can refer you to the GP and/or a mental healthcare organisation.

Making use of the university psychologist is free of charge for all Hanze UAS and University of Groningen students.

WAKE UP STUDENT PSYCHOLOGY AND COACHING

Wake Up Student offers psychological help and coaching for students aimed at common challenges: psychological complaints, study choice to career guidance, effective study habits, balancing study and daily student life As a member of ESN Groningen, you are entitled to a free first consultation.

ALL EARS

All Ears offers a valuable resource for students seeking support or feeling stuck. Students can find relief in sharing their experiences with someone outside their immediate circle. The All Ears student counsellors are well-informed about the challenges students face and prioritise maintaining complete confidentiality during their sessions.

Students can comfortably communicate in Dutch or English during these sessions, but there are counsellors proficient in other languages, like German, French, Luxembourgian, Portuguese, or Spanish, arrangements can be made. This ensures that language is not a barrier to seeking help and support.

@ease is a place where individuals can simply drop in or chat online anonymously and without an appointment, and it's completely free. While the main focus is on young people aged 12 to 25, all students are welcome. The organisation understands that many young individuals struggle to seek help when dealing with psychological and social issues, often due to shame, long waiting lists, the desire to solve problems independently, or discomfort with traditional practitioner visits.

If someone requires more assistance, the organisation can connect them with online therapy or help them find additional support through their volunteers and professionals in their local area.

MINDSHIFT COACHING

Mindshift Coaching offers to coach (international) students and helps them with: effective studying, mental health, procrastination and motivation, personal development & career directions. (As an ESN cardholders, you get a free 60 min 1:1 Coaching session with one of the psychology experts)

EMERGENCY SERVICES

Treatment for addictions is not limited to hardcore drugs; it encompasses various substances and behaviours such as alcohol, gaming, and marijuana. If you suspect that you or someone you know is struggling with an addiction, you can seek assistance from Verslavingszorg Noord Nederland (VNN). VNN specialises in addressing a wide range of addictions in diverse individuals. They offer guidance and can provide treatment when necessary. It's never too late to reach out for advice. While VNN's website is primarily in Dutch, you can contact them by phone at 088 234 34 34. Their 24/7 helpline ensures anonymous and confidential support.

If you recognise yourself in one of the following questions: When is smoking a joint no longer recreational? How would I benefit from not consuming alcohol for a month? I'm spending more time on video games than on my studies. How can I change this? Is it normal that people around me take XTC regularly? You can ask these questions to a specialist, at their digital consultation hour, which is free of cost and anonymous.

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If you're in urgent need of someone to talk to, whether you're contemplating suicide or concerned about a loved one, 113 provides access to mental health professionals who are available 24/7 for anonymous support. You can reach out to them via their website or by calling 0800 0113 (please note this service is currently available only to individuals calling from the Netherlands). On their website, you'll also find a self-test, online therapy courses, and access to psychologists.



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Study & Work: Finding a job

In the ever-evolving landscape of the job market, the quest for employment is a journey many of us embark on. Whether you're a newcomer searching for your first job in the Netherlands or a fresh graduate eager to kickstart your career, the path to finding a job can be both exciting and daunting. Groningen has a diverse job market ready to welcome you and we are here to guide you through the opportunities that can help you land your next job.

Horeca Groningen's Horeca industry is a vibrant, constantly changing world of culinary delights and exceptional service. Many establishments in the city appreciate the flexibility that student workers bring to their workforce. Jobs range from waiting tables and bar work to roles in the kitchen. Often times, international restaurants do not mind if you are not proficient in Dutch. However, some restaurants might require you to speak Dutch.

To find a job in Horeca, you can start by checking their website or LinkedIn. You can also visit these establishments in person, dropping off your CV and motivational letter, or inquire about job openings.

2 Supermarkets Working in a supermarket is a reliable and straightforward option to earn a living in Groningen. With several well-known supermarket chains like Albert Heijn, Jumbo, and Lidl, there are often job openings available for cashiers, stock clerks, and customer service representatives.

You can apply for positions at these supermarkets through their respective websites or inquire in person at their stores. Often, vacancies are posted on notice boards in the stores or online job portals.

3 Food delivery companies With the rise of online food delivery services, there is an increasing demand for delivery drivers and riders in Groningen. Companies like Thuisbezorgd, Uber Eats, and Deliveroo

have a significant presence in the city. If you have a bike or a scooter, you can explore flexible part-time or full-time opportunities in the food delivery sector. The advantage here is that you can choose your working hours, making it an excellent option if you are looking for temporary work.

4 Customer Service and Multilingual Opportunities Dutch companies frequently seek students to join their call centres, handling help hot lines or customer service inquiries. There are opportunities for students proficient in languages other than Dutch to contribute by translating documents, responding to emails, or providing customer service support. Keep an eye on job portals, company websites, LinkedIn, or explore openings at expanding tech giants such as Belsimple or Coolblue who often seek multilingual talent for international growth.

5 University Involvement Explore employment opportunities right within the university! Both Rijksuniversiteit Groningen (RUG) and Hanze UAS offer positions such as tutors, buddies, promotional roles, or positions at the help desk. While actively searching for these roles might be necessary, once secured, they come with numerous benefits and a chance to actively contribute to the university community.

6 Facebook Announcements For students with a knack for networking, Facebook can be an effective tool in the job hunt. Various Facebook groups and pages, such as "Jobs in Groningen" and "Expats in Groningen," regularly feature job announcements. These posts can range from part-time gigs to internships and even entry-level positions.

When using Facebook for job hunting, you should exercise due diligence, verifying the legitimacy of job offers and connecting with group members who might provide helpful insights or recommendations.

Reminder: Dutch law requires you to have a Dutch health insurance if you work in the Netherlands.

Courses

The ACLO offers courses in many sports which consist of a series of lessons of 5 to 10 weeks. Most courses are offered at a beginners level but there are also a few at intermediate and advanced levels.



Fitness

The ACLO has fitness and power training facilities. In the weekends and during holidays you can use it for free with a regular ACLO Card. On weekdays you need a Fitness Card for this.



Open competitions

The ACLO organizes a number of open competitions each year, such as a beach volleyball and football competitions. You play a competition of a few weeks against other teams of friends.

Recycle like the Dutch

The city has implemented various initiatives to make waste disposal and recycling accessible and convenient. In this article, we will explore the trash disposal methods, recycling options, and the concept of "statiegeld" (deposit) in Groningen.

Trash disposal

In general, the Dutch separate their waste into three to four categories: general waste, paper and glass (sometimes compost as well). In the city centre, you will find communal trash cans on nearly every street that you can access with a special waste card. Just take your waste down there, open the can with your card and you can put your trash into the bin. There are different bins for the three categories. Outside of the city centre, houses often have their own thrash can that has to be put onto the road on specific days in the months for collection.

To find the location of trash cans in your specific area, collection times and to learn more about the waste system, you can check the municipality's website.

Recycling Points in Groningen

Near the entrances of locations like supermarkets and electronics shops you can safely dispose of batteries. Go to the AfvalWijzer website to check where you can dispose of all recyclables in a location near you.

Statiegeld: The Dutch Deposit System

One of the Netherlands' successful initiatives is the statiegeld system, promoting the return of beverage containers for recycling. When purchasing a beverage in a plastic bottle or aluminium can, a deposit is paid (usually around €0.25). This deposit is refunded when containers are returned to the supermarket.





International Groningen Q&A internationalgroningen.nl @internationalgroningen

Question: Can you introduce yourself?

Anastasija: I'm Anastasija Zihareva. I came from Latvia to Groningen 11 years ago as an international student. I studied international communication, and then went to Minerva Academy. Fast forward some years and now I'm responsible for International Groningen.

Q: What do you do?

I'm in charge of International Groningen. International Groningen is from the Gemeente Groningen, it is a part of Groningen Alliance. Groningen Alliance is a strategic partnership of multiple organisations: the Municipality and province, the two hospitals, the University of Groningen and Hanze UAS and two schools. So all of these partners joined their forces on the topics that are relevant for the whole city. Together they chip in some cash every year and make strategic goals. They all agree on the topics that are important, internationalisation is one of them and I am responsible for that.

Q: What is International Groningen?

International Groningen is an umbrella organisation of all different projects that have to do with internationals e.g. information about different neighbourhoods, practical matters, cultural tips, news to find your job or internship.

We're a platform that leads to all the other projects, campaigns and we promote ourselves all together. It's like a beautiful cover so I'd say that creates one platform to navigate to all the specific projects.

Q: What kind of projects are part of International Groningen?

We have the **International Welcome Center North**, they are focused on formalities and all the practical matters. They specialise in the legal matters of living in the Netherlands, especially as an international from outside of the EU. But they also focus on things like doing taxes and health insurance.

Make it in the North is a job and internship platform for internationals in Groningen and three other provinces. They organise events where employers e.g from hospitality come who are looking for staff and that makes it easy if someone is looking for a job. They also organise an event where you can get tips for your CV from professionals. We also see that a lot of internationals want to stay in the Netherlands for work but do not speak Dutch because they do not have many Dutch friends that they can practise speaking Dutch with. That's why **My Local Friend** was established. It's a tool to connect international students, who speak some Dutch but need to practise more, and locals who want to help internationals and talk Dutch with them.

Last year we also did a campaign to inform internationals about municipal elections because EU students can vote in those too.

Lastly, we have events to show internationals how to cycle in the city where we're coupling them with volunteers to practise and to get to know the rules. It is always great fun and actually makes you feel a lot safer when cycling.

Q: What do you love most about your job?

I just like how it's growing and seeing how we have built so many amazing projects, how students and experts are being helped, how friendships are being made, how jobs are being found.

Simply to help people. They have so many questions! I think part of it is also my own motivation, because I've been a young international student myself, and I've also been very lost, very confused, very lonely. It was a mixture of culture shocks. Back then I was mostly getting my information from my friends that also had just figured things out like two days ago. A lot has changed since then!

Q: What main advice would you give to new internationals?

Whatever you're faced with, just go for it! Get to know more about taxes, make an appointment at the doctor, go and contact people. Yes it is complicated, but eventually you will manage. Just by doing, doing, doing, you'll eventually get the hang of things.

Because I think a lot of internationals expect so much from themselves. It is a lot: going abroad, not having your family around, challenging yourself, doing your education in English. But then, you adjust to it, it's baby steps. Don't expect that you'll be fully ready for things. There was an expression I really like: once you feel that you're fully ready for a thing, then it's too late because you've already overgrown it. Ask people for help, that's also another thing. Dutch people are super helpful, they will help you with explaining how these things work. So I really encourage you to seek help and ask people, it can be a great relief! And of course you can find a lot of great resources on our website.

Easy & Delicious Recepies

Creamy Tomato & Spinach Pasta

This creamy tomato and spinach pasta is a delicious and comforting dish that's simple to make on the stove. Enjoy your meal!

Ingridients (for 1 servng)

- 100 grams of pasta (your choice)
- 15 grams of olive oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 cloves of garlic, minced
- 200 grams of crushed tomatoes
- 120 grams of heavy cream
- 40 grams of fresh spinach leaves
- 15 grams of grated Parmesan cheese
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Red pepper flakes (if you like it hot)

Instructions

1. Cook the pasta in a large pot of salted boiling water according to the package instructions until al dente. Drain and set aside.

2. In a large skillet, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the chopped onion and garlic, and sauté until they become soft and fragrant.

3. Stir in the crushed tomatoes or tomato sauce. Let it simmer for a few minutes.

4. Reduce the heat and add the heavy cream. Stir to combine.

5. Toss in the fresh spinach leaves and allow them to wilt in the sauce.

6. Stir in the grated Parmesan cheese and continue to cook until the sauce thickens and the cheese is melted.

7. Season the sauce with salt and pepper to taste. Add red pepper flakes if you want some heat.

8. Combine the cooked pasta with the sauce in the skillet, stirring to coat the pasta evenly.

9. Serve with an extra sprinkle of Parmesan cheese if desired.

Bean and Cheese Quesadillas

Bean and cheese quesadillas are a quick, satisfying, and customizable meal that you can make in just a few minutes. Enjoy your quesadillas!

Ingridients (for 1 servng)

2 small flour tortillas

60 grams of canned refried beans

40 grams of canned corn

40 grams of shredded cheese (e.g., cheddar, Monterey Jack)

30 grams of salsa (optional)

Sour cream (optional)

Sliced jalapeños (optional)

Instructions

1. Heat a non-stick skillet or griddle over medium heat.

2. Spread half of the refried beans on one of the tortillas and half of the corn, leaving a small border around the edge.

3. Sprinkle half of the shredded cheese on top of the beans.

4. Place the other tortilla on top to create a quesadilla.

5. Carefully transfer the quesadilla to the hot skillet and cook for about 3-4 minutes on each side or until the tortilla is golden brown and the cheese is melted.

6. Remove from the skillet and let it cool for a minute before cutting it into wedges.

7. Serve with salsa, sour cream, and sliced jalapeños if desired.

Honey Mustard Chicken with Roasted Vegetables

Ingridients (for 1 serving)

For the Honey Mustard Chicken

200 grams boneless, skinless chicken breasts

15 grams honey

15 grams Dijon mustard

10 grams olive oil

2 grams garlic, minced

Salt and pepper to taste

Fresh parsley for garnish (optional)

For the Roasted Vegetables

200 grams mixed vegetables (e.g., carrots, bell peppers, zucchini, broccoli, cherry tomatoes)

10 ml olive oil

1 clove of garlic, minced

Salt and pepper to taste

A pinch of thyme

Grated Parmesan cheese (optional, for serving)



Instructions

For the Honey Mustard Chicken

1. Season the chicken breasts with salt and pepper.

2. In a small bowl, whisk together honey, Dijon mustard, olive oil, and minced garlic to make the honey mustard sauce.

3. Heat olive oil in a skillet over medium-high heat.

4. Add the seasoned chicken breasts to the skillet and cook for about 6-8 minutes on each side, or until they are cooked through and no longer pink in the centre.

5. During the last few minutes of cooking, pour the honey mustard sauce over the chicken and let it simmer for a minute or two, allowing the sauce to thicken slightly and coat the chicken.

6. Garnish with fresh parsley if desired and serve hot.

For the Roasted Vegetables

1. Preheat your oven to 220°C.

2. Wash, peel (if necessary), and chop the mixed vegetables into bite-sized pieces.

3. In a large bowl, combine the chopped vegetables, olive oil, minced garlic, salt, pepper, and dried thyme. Toss to coat the vegetables evenly with the oil and seasoning.

4. Spread the seasoned vegetables in a single layer on a baking sheet. Roast in the preheated oven for about 20-25 minutes, or until the vegetables are tender and slightly caramelized, stirring once or twice during cooking.

5. If desired, sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese before serving.
